WBO Team to Domincan Republic

During our stay in the Dominican Republic, we were able to perform 45 cataract procedures, 8 corneal transplants and 20 patients received strabismus surgeries. This mission was our 28th time to the Dominican and created many special memories for all of us.

One of the highlights of this trip was being able to once again restore the sight of a patient who began his care with us 20 years ago at the age of 16. This patient had corneal obscurity in both

eyes and his original surgery in 2004 was a complete success. Unfortunately, over time, a transplanted

cornea can also become obscured so that at age 36 this patient received his third transplant from Dr. Chaudhry. You can see from the photo at left, he is thrilled to be able to enjoy improved vision again. We were also touched by a unique case of identical twin girls, both of whom presented with the same strabismus diagnosis (eye turned inward). Dr. Cynthia Alley performed corrective procedures and we're pleased to report that both surgeries were a complete success.

Volunteer Spotlight: Bill Cluley

Bill Cluley, a retired ordained minister, traveled with us this year to the Dominican Republic on his 27th mission. Bill has been to 16 different countries over the past 15 years. He has been our right-hand man and jack-of-all trades serving in many different capacities.
