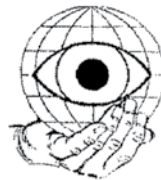
2008 WBO Golf Tournament

Dominican Republic Vision Mission 14

Nine members of a WBO Team descended upon the Dominican Republic for the 14th time. As in previous trips, we were very successful and were able to perform approximately 70 cataract procedures and 20 strabismus surgeries to correct the vision of children with crossed eyes. The trip was a combined effort of the Rotary Club of Salcedo and WBO. Rotarians, Dr. Rita Brito, a local dentist and Jose Tabor were integral in coordinating the mission details and served as interpreters.

This was our second visit to Salcedo General Hospital, where the facilities were fairly adequate, in spite of the lack of some equipment which we were able to supply. We were joined on this trip by two recent Temple medical school students, Susan Wang and Animesh Petkar, who both want to enter the field of ophthalmology. We were happy to learn recently they have both been accepted in ophthalmology residency programs. Perhaps someday they will rejoin WBO as accomplished surgeons in their field. We were proud to have them on our team and wish them continued success!

WBO Life Enhancement Awards

In 1999 the Life Enhancement award was created by WBO to help those in need living in Central Pennsylvania. The intention of this award is to assist a person with a vision impairment either by purchasing a piece of equipment or aid to enhance their life. WBO has purchased computers, software packages to make a computer accessible, taxi tickets to enable an individual to get to the grocery store and closed circuit TV's which enlarge information on a computer type screen, to name a few. All of the awards given help in keeping or maintaining the independence of these individuals.

Committee Chairperson Kay Macsi has announced that the recipients for 2008 include Katarina Eller of New Holland and a student at Elizabethtown College. She will receive a Franklin Language Master – which is an audio dictionary. Rebecca Wright of Columbia will be receiving a computer with a screen enlargement program, Angie Lopez will receive a computer and some Braille board games and Doris Brown, will receive an Amigo, a video magnifier. Both of these women reside in Lancaster. All items were selected because they enhance the day to day activities for each.

Ethiopia Vision Mission 3

Dr. Abiye Mulugeta, chairman of the department of ophthalmology at Das Resta Hospital in Addis Ababa, and hospital administrator Dr. Abraham Ashnake, helped coordinate our third visit to Ethiopia. They were very helpful and gracious hosts. We were also glad to see the family of Getachew Hirpo, who have played a key role in each trip to Ethiopia. Our visits there have been some of the most successful we've ever done in terms of procedures.

As we completed this third visit, we calculate that WBO teams have performed approximately 600 procedures! This trip was a partnership between the Rotary Club of Lancaster – Sunrise, WBO and the Rotary Club of Finot Addis Ababa, under the direction of their club president, Yigebashol Kassa.

We look forward to a future trip to Ethiopia, as it is painfully obvious of the huge demand for our services. The scene at our arrival is hard for us to describe in words, as we were greeted by a huge mass of people in need.
